LBPSB DCP Curriculum: 4 Categories of Instruction

Communication: Students are introduced to different forms of communication and their various uses. They learn that different media and audiences require different approaches both for consuming and producing messages.

Awareness: Students learn their rights with technology and the responsibilities that come with those rights. Proper etiquette is introduced and cyberbullying is addressed.

Information Literacy: Students are taught strategies for searching, evaluating, organizing and using digital resources.

Safety and Health: Students learn that it is important to protect themselves as they navigate the digital world. This includes creating and managing passwords, dealing with spam, privacy and protecting their digital footprint as well as the importance of maintaining a balanced lifestyle.

In the 2010-2011 school year teachers, administrators, consultants etc. collaborated to construct the DCP curriculum for the LBPSB.
